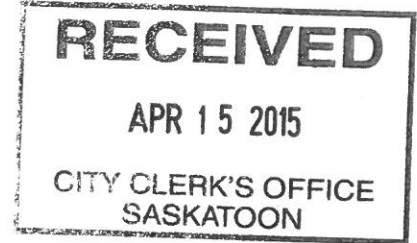

> I have received information that there may be a serious deficiency with the school zone photo radars recently implemented. As I understand it, the cameras operate from September to June but not on weekends, which is fine. However, they also operate on statutory holidays, Easter break, Christmas break, and February school break when the schools are closed. Why? Critics who oppose the program argue that photo radar is as much a revenue generating tool as it is an effort to improve street safety. If my information is accurate, there would seem to be some credence to these arguments. If the safety of children is the goal, then the cameras should not be operating when the schools are closed. This would be consistent with shutting them down on weekends. Although I've not been ticketed, I've assumed that photo radar cameras would be operating only when schools are open. Apparently, I've been wrong and am certain that many Saskatoon residents would have the same opinion.
> Therefore, I would ask you to investigate this as Chair of the Police Commission. I would suggest, if my information is correct, that the policy of operating cameras when schools are closed be rescinded.

Dear Mayor and City Council:

I am concerned with the reduction in police officers since 2010. The most recent information suggests we have about 20 less police officers on the streets now than we did 5 years ago, This while the city has grown significantly in both numbers and land mass in the last 5 years.

I am further concerned when I see the rescheduling of current officers away from gang and drugs enforcement. As the mayor states, " It's gangs and drugs that are the root causes of much of the gun crimes in the city."

I agree with the need to keep tax increases down, however restricting the numbers of police officers in our city is not the right way to govern. Other reductions or means must be found before police officer reductions. Please review the Police chiefs recommendation for officers and find a way to meet his request in this budget year and also in following years. His recommendation seem more than reasonable given the 2010 numbers. (I would suggest his recommendation may be to low....)

Safety and Security of Saskatoon citizens must be councils highest priority. Please implement the necessary changes to increase our police numbers as soon as possible.



Dear Chief Clive Weighill,

Around 3 am in the morning April 10th, I had to dial 911 for assistance in removing Mr. [redacted] from my house, as he had barged in and would not leave after I politely asked him to. Constables Candace Mitchell (Badge 681) and Eric Flogar (Badge 582) with the highest degree of professionalism I can imagine, maintained a low key and non-confrontational atmosphere such that, after [redacted] had gathered a few clothes and performed a sequence of extremely difficult yoga poses for us, they were able to most tactfully and gently persuade him to leave my home and enter the squad car in search of suitable accommodations for him for the night.

From my layman's point of view, Constables Mitchell and Flogar were models of restraint and subtle psychological control of a potentially explosive situation. I give them both my highest commendation for their professional, peacekeeping skills.

In fairness to Mr. [redacted] I should point out that I had asked him to care for my house for the months of December through March. Unfortunately for both myself and [redacted] during the winter months he suffered one or more psychotic, bipolar episodes, trashed my home, and loaded many of my personal possessions (e.g., a set of bathroom scales, the shower curtain, the steel shower curtain rod, pots and pans, Pyrex dishes and covers, etc., etc.) into the garbage bin in the lane because they offended his sensibilities.

But the point of this letter is not to complain about Mr. [redacted] behaviour but rather to commend both of the above mentionrd constables and the absolutely superb training they must have received under your guidance. Thus you, too, should share the honours for training your constables in this exemplary fashion. To all of you, a very warm thank you for work expertly done.

On Friday, May 31st, 2013, Saskatchewan Conservation Officer Justin Knackstedt tragically lost his life while assisting the RCMP with traffic control at an accident on Highway 11 south of Saskatoon

SPS Cst. Barry Low still remembers getting the call that an officer had been struck and killed. Without knowing who or from what agency, as a member of the Collision Analyst Unit, he rushed to the scene along with Cst.'s Patrick Foster, Stacey Papouches, and Sgt. Nolan Berg. It was their work, diligent and methodical, in collaboration with the RCMP that helped to secure a solid case for bringing Blaine Taypotat to justice.

Last weekend, their work was recognized at the Saskatchewan Association of Conservation Officers annual banquet as they humbly accepted the Annual Justin Knackstedt Memorial Award. The Award is administered by the SACO with a focus on a law enforcement individual or agency who have gone above and beyond to assist Conservation Officers in Saskatchewan. ^kf

SUBJECT: Inshtrix Community Satisfaction and Policing Priority Survey

FILE NO.: 9,005



BACKGROUND:

The Saskatoon Police Service (SPS) contracts an independent company to conduct a community satisfaction survey every three years. Inshtrix Research Limited conducted the survey in 2014, 2011 and 2008; another company provided the 2005 and 2002 analyses. The past surveys provide excellent benchmarking to allow comparisons. As noted in the Methodology Section, Aboriginal and visible minority populations were surveyed in extra numbers to ensure their perspective was reflected in the findings.

RECOMMENDATION:

That this report be received as information.

DISCUSSION:

In analyzing the years of data, the Service has steadily improved in relation to overall satisfaction in general and satisfaction from people who have actually had contact with the police. Since 2005, excellent progress has been made in conjunction with Police-Aboriginal relations. Although much improvement has been made with Aboriginal relations, more work is to be undertaken.

- Overall, Saskatoon residents continue to be highly satisfied with the SPS, with 92.0% (either very satisfied or somewhat satisfied) in 2014 compared with 91.8 % in 2011, 90.3% in 2008, 85% in 2005 and 89% in 2002 (Q.11). The proportion of residents indicating that they are 'very' satisfied has consistently increased over the years;
- For visible minority respondents, satisfaction with the Police Service is 97.4%, compared to 93.3% in 2011, 93.2% in 2008, 86% in 2005 and 88% in 2002. The City of Saskatoon's recent population growth is largely attributed to international newcomers as well as Aboriginal people from other parts of the province. The Service has focused a proportionate amount of resources toward the education of new Canadians;
- Overall satisfaction within the Aboriginal community is still strong at 86% (either very satisfied or somewhat satisfied). This is slightly lower than 2011 (89%) but still up from 2005 (59%) and 2008 (80%). New Police Service initiatives such as the "Cadet" program continue to positively impact Aboriginal-Police relationships in our community;

- Service issues continue to be the main barrier to total satisfaction with the SPS (37% in 2014). The main service issues cited were:
 - Police need more officers (16.9%)
 - Perceived slow response times (15.6%).An audit or response times is underway to determine the most efficient prioritization of calls for service;
- Of respondents with an SPS interaction, 77% agreed (somewhat or strongly) that SPS uses authority and force appropriately compared to 87% in 2011 and 76% in 2008. The proportion that strongly agreed was 39%, the same as in 2011 and up from 2008 (33%) (Q.10);
- Of respondents with an SPS interaction, 75% agreed (somewhat or strongly) that SPS has the trust of the public compared to 82% in 2011 and 70% in 2008. The proportion that strongly agreed was 28%, similar to 29% in 2011 and up from 23% in 2008 (Q.10);
- Perception of safety has increased slightly in 2014 to 80.1% compared to 75.1% in 2011, 73.5% in 2008, 76% in 2005 and 77% in 2002 (Q.17);
- Most residents believe that Saskatoon schools are safe areas for children. This belief has remained about consistent over the years for elementary schools, and has been steadily increasing for high schools. For both elementary and high schools, the proportion of those who believe schools are very safe is at its highest point on record;
- As in 2011, crime continues to be the main neighbourhood concern with break and enter (22.0%), robbery (9.3%) and drug law enforcement (8.4%) the top concerns.;
- The main concern among residents regarding the city as a whole also continues to be crime, specifically drug enforcement (23.7%), robbery (16.6%), break and enter (16.2%), and assault with injury (15.6%).;
- The top social disorder neighbourhood concern is vandalism (10.4%) and for the city is gang activity (26.4%). The second top concern for both neighbourhood and city is drinking or drunkenness in public (5.8% for neighbourhood vs. 7.8% for city) (Q.22);
 - the SPS “Guns and Gangs” Unit was recently developed to address these specific types of issues/concerns;
 - although public drunkenness is a social issue, the police service continues to work with other agencies such as Health to seek a remedy to these concerns.

The questions related to courtesy, knowledge and professionalism of our Communications officers and patrol officers were first inserted in the 2008 survey, so we only have 2008 and 2011 to compare to 2014.

In 2014, the respondents rated their interaction with Communications officers as follows (Q. 30-37):

- 96.8% (somewhat agreed, strongly agreed) Communication officers were professional compared to 92.5% in 2011 and 91% in 2008;
- 95.2% (somewhat agreed, strongly agreed) Communication officers were courteous compared to 94.2% in 2011 and 91.1% in 2008;

- 93.5% (somewhat agreed, strongly agreed) Communication officers were knowledgeable compared to 98.7% in 2011 and 91.1% in 2008;
- Overall quality of service by Communication Officers (good/excellent) was 85.5% compared to 83.3% in 2011 and 82.7% in 2008.

In 2014, the respondents rated their interaction with patrol officers as follows (Q.38-41):


- In line with previous years, the overall quality of service by patrol officers is rated excellent or good by over three quarters of respondents: 79% in 2014, 81.3% in 2011, and 77.1% in 2008.
- 93% (somewhat agreed, strongly agreed) patrol officers were professional compared to 98% in 2011 and 87% in 2008;
- 89% (somewhat agreed, strongly agreed) patrol officers were courteous compared to 96% in 2011 and 86% in 2008;
- 89% (somewhat agreed, strongly agreed) patrol officers were knowledgeable compared to 96% in 2011 and 84% in 2008;

CONCLUSION:

The perception of and actual service supplied by men and women of the Police Service have continued to increase in almost every category measured. Although substantial improvement has been made in relation to Police-Aboriginal relations, more work is to be done. According to the City of Saskatoon Planning Department, from 2005 to 2014 our population has grown by approximately 51,000 people. It is noteworthy that the SPS community satisfaction has remained high, and in most cases continued to increase, despite the City's rapid growth and resultant changing cultural dynamics.

ISSUE:

In May 2014, the Saskatoon Police Service (SPS) enacted a Task Force to address concerns surrounding Break and Enters and Stolen Autos. Currently, the Task Force Members (comprising of Patrol Divisional Administrative staff, a Patrol Analyst, General Investigations and Stolen Auto Staff Sergeants, Break and Enter Sergeant, and a member from our BECAP/SHOCAP Unit) meet on Tuesdays and Thursdays each week to discuss any immediate trends, patterns, and targets of interest to follow up on during the week as well as evaluate any successes or areas of continued concern.

RECOMMENDATION:

That this report be received as information.

CONCLUSION:

Special Constable John Ng, Patrol Analyst has developed two business intelligence dashboards that give "live" updates about certain metrics related to break and enters and stolen autos. It allows Task Force Members and any other member of the SPS to gain an immediate understanding of various aspects of these crimes including current trends and patterns and charges laid for the current CompStat period. The creation of these initial dashboards has provided a potential opportunity for the SPS to (1) create efficiencies in how Divisional Patrol staff compile reports for CompStat meetings and to (2) develop further dashboards (e.g., for robberies).

SUBJECT: Saskatoon Police Foundation

RECOMMENDATION:

That approval be granted for the creation of a Saskatoon Police Foundation (SPF), organized and operated by individuals who are at arms' length from the Saskatoon Police Service; and that permission be granted for the SPF to enter into an agreement with the Saskatoon Community Foundation (SCF) to receive and process donations/funds solicited by the SPF, issue tax receipts, invest those funds, and ultimately disburse those funds for approved policing initiatives in Saskatoon.

BACKGROUND:

At the March 20, 2014 Board of Police Commissioners meeting, it was resolved that the establishment of a Saskatoon Police Service Foundation be approved in principle, and that the Administration explore the feasibility of a police foundation.

DISCUSSION:

A charitable foundation is a registered charity whose objective is to raise or solicit funds/donations to build and endowment for the benefit of a particular charitable objective. Foundations can either be private or public but in both cases they must be charities. A 'private' foundation is controlled by a single donor or family through a board that is made up of a majority of directors that are at non-arm's length. Because of this, a private charitable foundation is not an option for the Saskatoon Police Foundation. A 'public' foundation is governed by a board that is made up of a majority of directors that are at arm's length from the Saskatoon Police Service and the Board of Police Commissioners. All charities are registered with the Canada Revenue Agency.

The following are two viable alternatives for the Board of Police Commissioners and the Saskatoon Police Service to consider:

- **Incorporate a non-profit corporation (“Saskatoon Police Foundation – the SPF”)** and apply to the Canada Revenue Agency for it to be designated as a ‘public foundation’ (registered charity). This process is likely to take the best part of a year and is likely to cost in excess of \$5,000, with the costs to be borne by the foundation, and not the Police Service. The executive and the Board of the SPF would be independent of the Saskatoon Police Service and would be comprised of leaders in the community skilled at fundraising and governance. The Chief of Police is routinely a non-voting member of police foundation boards, and provides advice to the Board to insure that the SPF does not become embroiled in controversy (e.g. advises the Board on the need to verify backgrounds of large donors to insure that donations are not accepted from criminal organizations). The SPF would issue charitable donation receipts to donors and would receive regular proposals from the SPS regarding police projects suitable for funding through donations that the SPF receives. The final decision regarding whether or not to fund these proposals rests with the SPF Board.
- **Create an un-incorporated association known as “Saskatoon Police Foundation – SPF” to raise money (donations) to be contributed to the Saskatoon Community Foundation, and the SPF would then apply to the Saskatoon Community Foundation on an annual basis to receive funding for individual projects.** This option allows us to use an unincorporated association to raise the funds/donations which would be submitted to the SCF for processing (e.g. since the SCF is already a registered charity it would issue tax receipts, invest the funds, etc.). The members of the unincorporated association would be independent of the Saskatoon Police Service and would be comprised of leaders in the community skilled at fundraising. This option means that fundraising activities could begin sooner because we would not have to wait for the incorporation process to be completed. This option would also reduce the administrative burden on community leaders who agree to donate their time to the SPS Foundation.

On December 17, 2014, police administration held a meeting to explore the second option listed above. The representatives from the Saskatoon Community Foundation presented on the possibility of the Saskatoon Police Service/Saskatoon Board of Police Commissioners entering into an agreement with the SCF to permit the creation of a Saskatoon Police Foundation. From their perspective, such a partnership would be advantageous to the Service in a number of ways because the SCF already has the legal structure in place that would allow for funds to flow through their foundation, which would eliminate the need for a Saskatoon Police Foundation to become its own legal entity. The verbal proposal from the Saskatoon Community Foundation consists of the following:

1. All fund raising and events management and marketing will be handled by the Saskatoon Police Foundation, through its own Board of Directors. The donations will be forwarded directly to the Saskatoon Community Foundation to be deposited and receipted where appropriate. The SCF will require individual donations and funds raised be designated in writing to the Saskatoon Police Fund.
2. The SCF will issue receipts to donors valid for income tax purposes for all charitable donations received by it.

3. The SCF will record the flow-through donations in the SCF's annual report and/or other publications and will identify distributions to qualified donees coming from the donors unless otherwise directed in writing.
4. The SCF will charge a 1% administrative fee of the total capital annually in the fund. The SCF will also retain any income earned on the funds before they are disbursed to qualified donees. Funds will have to remain with the SCF for a period no less than two full investment quarters to qualify for the reduced administrative fee of 1%. Less than two full investment quarters will result in a 5% administrative fee being charged.
5. Parties other than the SCF will be responsible for donation solicitation, pledge tracking, invoicing, and/or collection of outstanding funding resources.
6. The SCF will provide timely printed lists of funds and donations received to date to the Saskatoon Police Foundation for reconciliation purposes.
7. The SCF will create an online portal for credit card processing directly associated with the Saskatoon Police Foundation.
8. All materials where the SCF logo appears will have to be pre-approved by SCF staff prior to printing or being posted as web based uploads. This will include solicitation materials and sponsorship levels in relation to donation accounts.
9. The SCF will be listed or logoed as a 'partner' with their full name being incorporated whenever charitable receipting is mentioned.
10. The SCF will reserve the right after consultation with the Saskatoon Police Foundation and the Chief of Police to refuse any donation it believes to be fraudulent or solicited under inappropriate circumstances, or any funds that have promised or perceived deliverables that cannot be met by the Saskatoon Police Foundation or the Saskatoon Community Foundation.
11. As required by law, all fund recipients recommended by the Saskatoon Police Foundation must be qualified donees, including registered charities or municipalities such as the City of Saskatoon, as required by Revenue Canada Agency. Disbursement will be provided to qualified donees only with the written approval of the Chief of Police for the City of Saskatoon.

CONCLUSION:

Existing members of the Saskatoon Police Service will not be able to join the SPF due to existing conflict of interest rules which prohibit peace officers from soliciting/accepting donations. If approved, the Saskatoon Police Foundation will solicit donations to the Saskatoon Community Foundation and those donations will be designated specifically for policing initiatives in Saskatoon. The SCF will then issue tax receipts to the donors, accumulate and invest the funds, and eventually utilize those specific funds to finance worthwhile policing initiatives approved by the SPF and the Chief of Police.


SCF will seek the appropriate tax advice, when necessary, to ensure that the specific projects advanced by Saskatoon Police Service for funding satisfy CRA's requirement under *The Income Tax Act*. The Saskatoon Community Foundation will charge the Saskatoon Police Foundation a 1% annual administrative fee of the total capital in the fund. The SCF will also retain any interest income earned on the funds before they are disbursed.

If the option to partner with the Saskatoon Community Foundation is approved, this decision may be revisited in the future to determine if the Saskatoon Police Foundation should move to

become a non-profit corporation (option #1). This option may become beneficial if contribution levels to the fund become large.

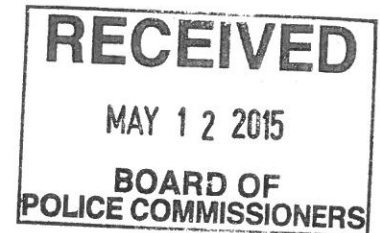

ISSUE:

The 2014 fiscal year for the Saskatoon Police Service ended December 31, 2014. A report has been prepared summarizing the overall Capital Budget performance.

RECOMMENDATION:

That the information be received.

DISCUSSION:

Capital project activity for 2014 has been summarized as follows:

Completed Projects

Thirteen capital projects were completed in 2014 with expenditures totaling \$2,055,853. Notable projects include P2132 Old Headquarters Renovations (\$500,917), P2490 Computer Disaster Recovery Site #1 (\$282,530) and P2499 - 2014 Computer Network Storage Replacement (\$317,607). There were no significant budget issues to report regarding completed projects.

Active Projects

Twenty-six capital projects with approved funding of \$124,824,083 remain active among these is funding of \$121.1 million for the New Headquarters Facility. Thirteen projects were carried over from previous years. All projects are at varying stages of completion with no significant expenditure overruns expected.

On - Hold Projects

Seven projects with approved funding of \$1,549,000 have been categorized as on-hold. Three of these projects totaling \$1.1 million were radio replacement projects that were contingent on an inventory analysis once we moved into the New Headquarters building.
